

#### PROJECT SUMMARY


Endless war. Rampant inequality. Rising prejudice and authoritarianism. Like a lot of millennials, Z wakes up every day to an infuriating and heartbreaking world. She desperately hopes and dreams of a better future but feels lost and impotent whenever she faces the enormity of humanity's problems.

This all changes when her friend Alicia invites her to make a globe-trotting documentary that uncovers just how human society got so backwards. Drawing from the work of cultural historian Riane Eisler that spans the hyper-masculine zeitgeist to the mystical snake goddess of ancient Crete, Alicia and Z reveal two foundational lenses to view humanity: domination and partnership. Domination describes human societies built on forcebased control and partnership describes human societies built on caring and mutual respect.

HUMANKIND is two films in one: a documentary inside of a fiction film. It follows fictional characters Alicia and Z as they create a real-world documentary based on Eisler's work. By exploring domination and partnership, and speaking with anthropologists, economists, neuroscientists, and more, the documentary exposes the roots of economic inequality and social injustice and proves that more peaceful and caring societies are achievable. All the while, Alicia and Z soar between our dystopic modern world and real societies in Earth's past and present that got things right, discovering new ways of looking at the world. It's about building an economic system based on caring. It's about redefining what it means to be human. It's about rewarding the good in people, and letting old ideas go.

With the documentary-style energy of This Giant Beast. That is the Global Economy and a good measure of humor and hip-hop, Alicia and Z go on a journey packed with inspiration, imaginative animation, and insight. Alicia and Z know change won't happen overnight, but in the end, they don't just have a movie, they have the blueprints to put humanity back on track.







#### DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT

**HUMANKIND** tells a story that hasn't been told in cinema and is one that is urgently needed. Humanity faces a number of surging crises - a global resurgence of authoritarianism, growing inequality, rising violence against women, genocides of indigenous people, climate change and most recently, an unprecedented pandemic. We can all see that the way that we are doing things is not working. Riane Eisler's work, and the message of our film, offers evidence that humans can do better.

The mission of our project is to reveal domination in the world and to prove that partnership is a real, achievable option for humanity. The film will do this by challenging narratives that perpetuate inequality: humans are selfish by nature, economic and social success are not possible without greed and domination, and war is inevitable and moral.




**IAN HODDER (V.O.):** ...and what the evidence shows is that it was advanced, peaceful and men and women had very similar status.




Alicia and Z chart the course of how domination- oriented cultures seized hold over the majority of humanity - not only physically conquering, but also writing new myths, stories and religious books in which women were cast as second class citizens. Alicia and Z present fragments of the Bible, The Koran, Confucianism, and The Oreisteia, which entrenched domination thinking into the mainstream and led to millennia of wars, atrocities and abuse of women and children.

This is all too much for Z to take and she gets pissed at men, who she sees as responsible for this injustice. And while Alicia feels the same, she also thinks that the situation is not so simple - that both women AND men are hurt by the domination system. To demonstrate this to Z, Alicia introduces her to Terry, a friend who performs a rap about how domination damages and represses men. Z finally agrees with Alicia - everybody gets screwed in the domination system.



A group of men, one by one, enter the ring and surround Terry. He stands in the middle ready to defend himself.





Terry continues rapping as more men surround him.




Terry takes off his gloves, unafraid of the men around him, and leaves the ring.






As Terry passes the exercising men, they start following him.

The weight of these revelations fall heavy on Z, who begs for a break from the film. Alicia refuses, and this leads to a big conflict. As a result, Alicia realizes that she has been a control monster and Z realizes that she hasn't taken any responsibility for her role in the world - she blames the system instead of working to change things. They resolve to act differently, which gives them a burst of inspiration. Full of energy, they decide to go beyond Eisler's research and find contemporary societies that live in partnership.

After lots of research and with the help of some friends, they show 5 cultures in the world today that are characterized by partnership: The Batek people of Malaysia and the Aka people of Republic of Congo, the Pueblos Mancomunados in Mexico, the government of Finland, and the profitable company Patagonia, which has partnership practices. These sections are mixed with sequences that address the importance of childcare on the health of a society, the neuroscience evidence that humans are predisposed for caring and empathy, the positive economic impact of gender equality, and the possibilities of creating a new economic system that is based on caring.

Alicia and Z are now content and hopeful, knowing that if humans can live in partnership in these diverse places, it truly is possible anywhere. After a final rap about how to take practical steps towards partnership, they conclude the film with an emotional story from Eisler about the importance of courage and love in transforming the world.

## MAIN CHARACTERS & CASTING IDEAS



### ALICIA KEYS

Alicia (30s) is a chic, professional film-maker/activist who gets shit done. She's full of energy, power and is in command of every situation she finds herself. Underneath it all, she's absolutely brokenhearted by the suffering she sees in the world, but channels that pain into a creative energy that keeps her motivated, trying to bring change to society.

#### Z ZENDAYA >

Z (early 20s) is a fun-loving, upbeat college graduate who is struggling to find purpose in a world that feels so broken. She is artistic and creative, prone to spontaneous freestyle rapping, and, like many artists, is overwhelmingly sensitive. She's passionate and driven when she has a goal, but otherwise tends to be passive. At the beginning of the film, she feels like a victim of the world's sorry state, but transforms into a self-possessed, confident changemaker.



## TERRY DONALD GLOVER MANNY JACINTO or STEPHAN JAMES

Terry is Alicia's friend who raps a song about how domination hurts men and joins Helen Mirren on her song about Domination Economics. He spends time with Alicia and Z talking about how domination narratives perpetuate gender stereotypes and encourage violence in the world.









## REENACTMENT RIANE JESSICA CHASTAIN

Reenactment Riane is an over-the-top, self-aware reenactment of Riane Eisler in her research years.



## GAEL GARCÍA Gael is Z's friend who educates Alicia and Z about the Pueblos Mancomunados, a partnership-oriented collective of towns in Oaxaca, Mexico.







#### HELEN MIRREN

Playing a rapping version of herself, she performs songs about economics and GDP.







ASHTON KUTCHER
Ash is Z's friend who educates Alicia and Z about caring economics and the partnership-oriented policies of Finland.

Daniel Glick is an Emmy-winning producer, writer, director and editor. His first feature documentary, A Place to Stand, the powerful true story of poet Jimmy Santiago Baca, was broadcast on PBS in 2019 and won two Telly Awards. Daniel's short-form work has won numerous film festival awards and covers a wide range of themes, including social justice, indigenous rights, the power of the arts, conservation, and prison reform. His films about conservation and indigenous rights have often been used as lobbying tools and have led to practical policy changes.

## AIWEN WANG-HUDDLESTON






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#### RIANE EISLER
